Learning outcomes

- -Identify the management and planning processes of any audiovisual product.
- -Distinguish the interpretation and oriented analysis of the informative, emotional and persuasive components of audiovisual discourse.
- -Knowing the different relationships between verbal and visual language.
- -To evaluate and apply the main theories proposed on models of analysis and interpretation of visual codes.
- -Handle the codes involved in the production and interpretation of images.

Assessment systems

In order for students to be assessed, they must have submitted the corresponding form (online form) and photograph to the teacher.

The evaluation of the subject will include both the theoretical and the practical part of the material covered in class.

70% of the mark will correspond to continuous assessment (CA) and 30% to the final exam (FE). However, this distribution will be explained in detail in the classroom.



All continuous assessment tasks (CA) are recoverable (in all exam sessions) as it will be explained in the classroom and in the subject area on the virtual campus.

- According to the UEx assessment regulations "Fraudulent performance of any assessment test will result in a failing grade, with a "0" mark in the corresponding exam session, regardless of the fact that the teacher may request the opening of an informative/disciplinary file before the Rector of the University of Extremadura" (art. 8.6). In the different activities, the appropriate measures will be taken to try to avoid this type of action, including the use of the means provided by the UEX to teachers, such as anti-plagiarism software.
- The monitoring and evaluation of the exam and the practical exercises proposed in the course, as well as the final assignments, will involve a minimum of 25 hours of work for the teacher.
- There will be an alternative final exam of a global nature in all the sessions, so that passing it will mean passing the course.
